THE MOVEMENT

Check the jewel count before you trust the calibre. At 27.90 mm × 5.00 mm and 19,800 A/h, the 565 (24 jewels) is dimensionally identical to **560** (17 jewels), **563** (17 jewels). These are told apart by the marking on the bridge, not by eye — and they are not worth the same money.

Read the part numbers, not just the calibre. The plate and bridges are numbered to the 565, but several parts carry the **551** and **552** prefix — because the 565 was built on those calibres. That lineage is printed in the catalogue, and it is what tells you which replacement parts are factory-correct and which movement has been made up from a parts bin.

The movement is not the calibre Omega listed for this case. Omega's 2012 parts sheet for 168.0022 gives 564; the movement here is a 565. That is what a married watch is, and it moves the value more than anything else on this page — so read the case reference twice before it goes out in writing.

CONDITION

Movement runs and sets. Balance staff and hairspring good; amplitude not measurable from photographs. Winding crown is a generic replacement, not the Omega part for this case. Light corrosion on the barrel bridge, cosmetic only. Case: heavy polishing on the lugs, hallmarks still legible. Crystal scratched, replaceable. **UNVERIFIED**

You were offered US\$200. Read the metal line before you answer them.
